

<u>Looking Back</u> There Were Signs

Looking Back There Were Signs is a multidisciplinary exhibition exploring visual artist and screenwriter Samuel Leighton-Dore's adult diagnosis of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), and the ways in which new diagnoses can recontextualise old ideas of self.

From a wall-mounted ceramic screenplay, to an animated 'cardboard cutout' factory production line, Leighton-Dore draws on different elements of his varied creative practice to examine ideas around authenticity, 'masking' and the performance of self. Just as an actor might run through their lines before arriving on set, Leighton-Dore reflects on a private rehearsal of social interactions ahead of time, along with the detached, out-of-body sensation that comes with watching oneself move through day-to-day life, as if a character in an imagined film.

The resulting artworks are inherently self-conscious in nature, capturing the artist's ongoing struggle with rejectionsensitivity and the anxiety of anticipating new people and environments, while thrumming the tension not only between contrasting mediums like ceramics and animation, but between who one is and how one edits, constructs and presents oneself in order to move through the world.

Together, these reflections form a self-portrait that simultaneously gives life to, and eulogises, narratives of self — constantly re-edited, rearranged and recomposed as the artist works to project versions of himself for audiences, real and imagined.

Even as he writes this, untied from himself in third person, Leighton-Dore is considering gallery visitors reading his words - composing a particular version of who he is, in this instance, an artist he hopes you might accept. INT. ART GALLERY - DAY Visitors pause at a Ceramic text-based artwork.

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


Samuel Leighton-Dore Looking Back There Were Signs (Title) 2024 glazed ceramic dimensions variable, 39 pieces




